Curriculum / Staff Professional Learning - Reading

Our school is thriving with energy and embracing the opportunity of new learnings. With one example of the right step forward in teaching and learning, is the way we teach Reading!

Ambitious (an adjective): is having or showing a strong desire and determination to succeed. And with our staff inquiring into Structured Literacy this year, we hold a strong motivation for our students and teachers to be successful.

Supported challenge can be 'scary safe' for students, however all our staff continue to improve their practice using evidence-based research to provide gains in achievement in literacy, therefore improving engagement and motivation in our learners.

It is our overarching goal across the school (and always has been) in building knowledge and proficient reading, writing, thinking, and communication skills. These elements of being a literate individual are the currency for opportunity.

While teachers dig deeper into how Structured Literacy will look like, it is important to note how our region's Department of Education improvement leaders are supporting not only our school but a large number of schools across the region. Their provision of professional learning that will best meet our school's need will be threaded across the year and is an exciting space and opportunity for our staff and students.

And what is Structured Literacy? The research advocates an instructional approach to ensure children from Foundation to Year 6 receive high quality literacy instruction they need for reading, writing and academic success.

It includes vital components of reading comprehension and writing (decoding, encoding and language comprehension) and additional components to develop knowledge and understanding of vocabulary, and the vital structures in reading and writing.

This massive layer of work influences our teaching practices, challenges our thinking and educates our staff with the current research in how to effectively teach reading. This collaborative journey we are on in 2024, will have the greatest impact on our students' reading achievements. Our students have the right to an excellent education and our teachers have the right to the content and pedagogical knowledge that will allow them to be excellent educators.

Prep/1 News

What a busy couple of weeks we have had in Prep/1. I can't wait to see you all at parent teacher interviews. It's great to see that majority of the families have booked in. For those who haven't booked yet, you still have until Thursday 27th of March. If you are needing a parent teacher interview via phone, please let me know and I can phone you at your allocated time.

Well done to the students who were rewarded with a prize from the Heytesbury Show for their amazing handwriting and artwork. Their handwriting and drawing has come such a long way in just 6 weeks.







In maths we have been learning to subitise. Subitising refers to instantly recognising the number of items in small groups of up to four items without counting. For example, with a 6-sided dice If you roll 2 it is seeing it as 2 wonky eyes.

- 3- seeing it like 2 but with an extra dot in the middle.
- 4- linking it to squares with 4 corners, just like the 4 corners of our classroom.
- 5- just like 4, but with a dot in the middle, or 2, 2 and 1, or 2 going diagonal and 3 doing the other way diagonal.
- 6-3 and 3 or 4 and 2 more, or 2, 2 and 2.

On Friday last week I sent home with students a number formation booklet. This is a big focus in our class right now as students are forming their numbers backwards or incorrectly starting at the correct start position. It would be greatly appreciated if you could practice with your child at home.

In spelling the prep students have been learning the new sounds of b, c, g, h. Students are now able to segment sounds for writing and spell the words correctly. Students are even having a go at writing sentences with the words we have been learning. Grade 1 students have been focusing on the spelling of /ee/. Students are comprehending that two letters can make one sound and there is multiple spellings of the sound. For example the sound /ee/ can be spelt as e, ea, ee or y like as in donkey, eat, keep, she.

In writing we have been focusing on narratives. Students are able to identify that a story needs, characters, settings, a problem and a solution. We are working on students coming up with make believe stories and ensuring they have the correct format of a narrative.

In reading the prep students have been focusing on ensure they have their finger under the word they are reading at the time to ensure they know where they are up to and help decode unknown words. It would be great if every student could read their decodable and have someone read to them each night. When you read with your child every day

- Make reading fun and enjoyable. Children learn about reading by watching, copying and interacting with others.
- Let your child choose and re-read books they are interested in.
- Talk about the book before you start reading. Talk about the title and what could happen in the story.
- Discuss the pictures and how they add to the story.
- Whilst reading ask your child questions about the story such as "What do you think might happen next?" "Why do you think that?"
- After reading talk about the story. Ask questions such as "Which part of the story did you like best?" "What was exciting, funny or sad in the story?"
- Take turns at reading favourite stories with brothers, sisters or friends.
- Choose a variety of reading materials such as newspapers, magazines, posters, street signs, recipes and shopping lists.

2/3 News

Week 6 of term 1! It is very hard to believe that we are now on the downward slide of the term. I know for me; these 6 weeks have absolutely flown by!

It has been a very busy term, and we still have plenty on the calendar before we get to school holidays, all important events are loaded onto the calendar for you to see.

It is great to see that many families have already taken the opportunity to book their Parent Teacher Interviews via Compass, I am looking forward to the speaking with all students' families. The end of term 1 is the perfect time to meet with you all to discuss the progress of your child's learning and their school experience so far this year. If you haven't booked already, I would encourage you to book a spot that is most convenient to you before they fill up.

Some students have been doing a great job with their home reading, which is fantastic to see. I do understand that life is busy, however, please encourage your child to read each night throughout the

school week and to sign their reading activity into the Student Diary. I have informed the students that if there are no adults available to hear them read, they are able to read to themselves or a sibling, and they are allowed to write in their Student Diary what they read. You will continue to hear me state the importance of home reading on a regular basis throughout the year. Unfortunately, I am yet to sight some students home reading pouches.

Students have all been working very hard in our writing sessions over the past few weeks with our focus being Narratives/Fairy Tales. We have largely concentrated on the structure of a narrative and including higher level descriptive vocabulary into our writing. Seeing the impact of this focus in the students writing has been very rewarding. Students are currently in the process of creating their own characters and setting for a narrative they will then write and publish. Their story must include a complication and a solution. After all their hard work, they are all excited to finally be able to write their own story!

In numeracy, we have been focusing on 2, 3 and 4 digit numbers and are working on addition and subtraction with these. We have also been looking closely at the value of each number within these numbers, i.e., '347' is 3 hundreds, 4 tens, and 7 ones. Completing a range of different hands on activities where students physically make and manipulate these numbers to create a larger or small number, adding or subtracting from these numbers.

All students have access to Reading Eggs and Essential Assessment at home, if you have a computer or device, your child is able to login and practise some maths at home in the My Numeracy portal on the Essential Assessment website, I will send their login details home with them in their student diaries.

Well done to our class on their handwriting and art entries into the Heytesbury Show. They were all very proud of their work, as was I. Congratulations to those students whose handwriting and/or art piece received recognition.

As always, our school is a welcoming place for parents and carers. If you have any concerns or queries, please do not hesitate to contact me.

It has been a very positive term thus far, and before we know it we will be kicking off term 2! Cheers Jannique Hanegraaf















4/5/6 News

In **Reading** we are moving into identifying and understanding <u>'Figurative Language'</u> in the texts we read. This includes language functions such as similes, metaphors, personification, idioms, puns and hyperbole. This is a tricky reading strategy because the students need to put their literal thinking aside. Any additional help at home would be very handy for this strategy.

In **Writing** we are focusing on narrative in the lead up to NAPLAN next week. Our main focus is on incorporating more sophisticated vocabulary into our writing pieces. This includes using adjectives, adverbs and using a thesaurus to uplevel synonyms.

In **Maths** we have been learning how to use our multiplication skills to calculate indices, square and triangular numbers. We learnt our first formula for calculating triangular any triangular number in the sequence:

Tn = n(n+1)/2

Imogen: I enjoyed one of the guest speakers called Danille. Her daughter needed a dress but it was too expensive so she made her own. It was really inspiring!


Archer: My favourite part of the leaders congress was how to become a good leader in the school and the community.



Parent/Visitor Sign In:

All parents or visitors who are coming into the school for more than 10 minutes are required to sign in. You will need to sign in and out of the visitor register at the office. This allows us to account for you in the event of an emergency.

Uniform:

We ask that you ensure your child is in uniform each day to continue the high standards we set for ourselves. Hats are to be worn until the end of Term 1, and again in Term 4, so please ensure your child has a broad brimmed hat (named) available every day. Those students without a hat must remain under cover, for the duration of recess and lunchtime. If your child requires a new hat, they can be purchased through the front office, costing \$17.50. Uniform orders can also be purchased from the office.

Named Clothing:

Parents are asked to check that clothing is clearly named. If you have second-hand clothes, please check that the name has been changed. If clothes are correctly named, we have some hope of returning items to the correct owners. All lost property of students will be stored at the front office where there are currently quite a few items. Please check to see if you are missing any items so they can be returned.

Communication:

If you need to speak with your child's teacher, please contact the office for an appointment or alternatively send your teacher an email. Please note: Staff are often very busy in the mornings prior to instruction time, preparing for the day ahead. Staff also have meeting commitments after school on Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 3.30pm onwards and therefore it is not always possible to meet after school on these days. If you have an urgent concern about your child regarding any start of year questions or concerns, please make contact through the office.

Daily Routine:

School commences at 8.55am and ends at 3.15pm. Students should not arrive at school before 8.45am. Students should leave promptly at 3.15pm at the end of the day. At 8:53am, the music is played; this signifies to the students that they should move into their classroom and prepare themselves for the daily learning. Recess: 10.55am - 11.25am. Lunch: 1.25pm - 1.35pm (supervised eating) and 1:35pm - 2.15pm

(lunch play). 3:15pm is the end of the school day. Staff members are on duty until buses leave and town students collected.

Late Arrivals:

Students arriving after 8:55am should report to the office. Office staff will record their attendance as a late arrival and students will then go to class. Parents will be contacted by the principal if lateness is becoming a problem.

Early Departure:

If you wish to collect your child from school before dismissal time, they must be signed out at the office. This ensures all students can be accounted for in the case of an emergency. To assist, please phone the office prior to collecting your child so they can be ready for collection.
