

2/3 News

We can't believe it is week 5 already! We were finally able to celebrate having everyone at school the other day. It is the first time in weeks that we have had a full class. Students are getting ready for the busy testing period ahead to see their growth over the year. It is vital that your child attends school on time every morning to ensure we can get the most out of the school day.


In maths we have finished our topics on chance and fractions. In fractions we focused on partitioning areas, lengths and collections to create halves, thirds, quarters and fifths, such as folding the same sized sheets of paper to illustrate different unit fractions and comparing the number of parts with their sizes. We are now focusing on 2D and 3D shapes by identifying key features of squares, rectangles, triangles, kites, rhombuses, circles, prisms, and pyramids such as straight lines or curved lines and counting the edges and corners.

In writing we have been focusing on poetry. We have explored sensory and diamante poetry. Below are some examples of our sensory poems if you haven't already read them on our schools Facebook page.



4/5/6 News

Almost at the halfway mark in the term! The time between now and the end of term will absolutely fly by. We have so much still to fit in to the term, it's going to be a busy end with Melbourne Cup public holiday on Tuesday, TAPs On happening Thursday 9th November and then Grade 5/6 camp to Melbourne Wednesday 15th – Friday 17th November!

In reading, our class had been focusing on fluency and expression in their reading. This is something that should be an ongoing skill for all students to practise. We have now moved on to the plot, problem/s and solution/s in chapter books. Students are paying close attention to the story to discover if their chapter book is a series of short stories that flow throughout the whole book, with a new problem and solution within each chapter, or if their story is one single story where the problem isn't solved until the end of their book. Please remember to encourage your child to read at home each night and write a short summary in their student diary. I check these regularly (daily when they are given to me by the students), and the students collect individual points for their efforts.

In writing, our class has been looking at different styles of poetry. So far, we have looked at sensory poems, cinquain poems and haiku poems. For the remainder of the week, students will be writing a poem of their choice which will be published how they choose – written or digitally in a creative manner.

In maths for week 5 & 6, we are focusing on Time! Throughout the year it has become very apparent the number of students who struggle to tell the time on an analogue clock. We are looking at the basics of telling the time – o'clock, quarter past, half past, quarter to and the different ways these can be read, e.g., 45 minutes past 3, or 15 minutes to 4 etc. We will also focus on elapsed time – how much time passes between two or more different times. Please assist your child's learning in this area by asking them the

time at home frequently, don't do it for them or assume they know. In the technological world we live in today, children are simply not exposed to analogue time like we were in our childhood.

In our integrated unit for term 4, we are learning about the Australian Government and the different levels of Government within Australia. It is wonderful to see the interest that our students have in Australian history and the way our country was built; how events in history have shaped Australia to be the country it is today.

I thank you all for your support over the year so far, and I am very excited to see how much growth all students have achieved over the year.

Science & PE News

News from the science room

Gosh plants and animals are amazing. We are week 5 into our fascinating units about plant and animal adaptations. Our 4/5/6 scientists have been learning all about the harsh conditions of the world's deserts. You would think nothing could survive there but in actual fact deserts are teaming with life and we have been discovering how. Our 2/3 scientists have been asking the big questions. What is living and non-living and how do I tell the difference? What is the difference between a plant and an animal? How do I classify animals into different scientific groups? Sometimes the answers aren't as obvious as you might think. Our Prep/1 scientists have spent the term as palaeontologists. They have been comparing the bones of modern

animals to dinosaurs and prehistoric animals to work out what they may have looked like, how they may have moved and what they probably ate.

Attendance Policy

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to

- ensure all children of compulsory school age are enrolled in a registered school and attend school every day the school is open for instruction
- ensure students, staff and parents/carers have a shared understanding of the importance of attending school
- explain to school staff and parents the key practices and procedures Simpson Primary School has in place to
 - o support, monitor and maintain student attendance
 - o record, monitor and follow up student absences.

scope

This policy applies to all students at Simpson Primary School.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the Department of Education and Training's School Attendance Guidelines. It does not replace or change the obligations of Simpson Primary School, parents and School Attendance Officers under legislation or the School Attendance Guidelines.

Definition

Parent – includes a guardian and every person who has parental responsibility for the child, including parental responsibility under the <u>Family Law Act 1975</u> (Cth) and any person with whom a child normally or regularly resides.

Policy

Schooling is compulsory for children and young people aged from 6 to 17 years (unless an exemption from attendance or enrolment has been granted).

Daily attendance is important for all children and young people to succeed in education and to ensure they do not fall behind both socially and developmentally. School participation maximises life opportunities for children and young people by providing them with education and support networks. School helps people to develop important skills, knowledge and values that set them up for further learning and participation in their community.

Students are expected to attend Simpson Primary School during normal school hours every day of each term unless:

- there is an approved exemption from school attendance for the student
- the student has a dual enrolment with another school and has only a partial enrolment in Simpson Primary School, or
- the student is registered for home schooling and has only a partial enrolment in Simpson Primary School for particular activities.

Both schools and parents have an important role to play in supporting students to attend school every day.

Simpson Primary School believes all students should attend school all day, every day when the school is open for instruction and is committed to working with its school community to encourage and support full school attendance.

Our school will identify individual students or cohorts who are vulnerable and whose attendance is at risk and/or declining and will work with these students and their parents to improve their attendance through a range of interventions and supports.

Students are committed to attending school every day, arriving on time and are prepared to learn. Our students are encouraged approach a teacher and seek assistance if there are any issues that are affecting their attendance.

Simpson Primary School parents are committed to ensuring their child/children attend school on time every day when instruction is offered, to communicating openly with the school and providing valid explanations for any absence.

Parents will communicate with the relevant staff at Simpson Primary School about any issues affecting their child's attendance and work in partnership with the school to address any concerns.

Parents will provide a reasonable explanation for their child's absence from school and endeavour to schedule family holidays, appointments and other activities outside of school hours.

Supporting and promoting attendance

Simpson Primary School's Student Wellbeing and Engagement Policy supports student attendance.

Our school also promotes student attendance by: attendance focused program; breakfast club held on a Tuesday.

Recording attendance

Simpson Primary School must record student attendance twice per day. This is necessary to:

- meet legislative requirements
- discharge Simpson Primary School's duty of care for all students

Attendance will be recorded by the classroom teacher at the start of the school day and after lunch using Compass.

If students are in attendance at a school approved activity, the teacher in charge of the activity will record them as being present.

Recording absences

For absences where there is no exemption in place, a parent must provide an explanation on each occasion to the school.

Parents should notify Simpson Primary School of absences by: phone, email or noted via Compass. If you have any problems, please contact the office during office hours Monday, Tuesday & Thursday from 8.30am until 3.30pm & Fridays from 8.30am until 10.30am

If a student is absent on a particular day and the school has not been previously notified by a parent, or the absence is otherwise unexplained, Simpson Primary School will notify parents by SMS/push notification message via Compass. Simpson Primary School will attempt to contact parents as soon as practicable on the same day of the unexplained absence, allowing time for the parent to respond.

If contact cannot be made with the parent (due to incorrect contact details), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on the student's file held by the school, where possible, on the day of the unexplained absence.

Simpson Primary School will keep a record of the reason given for each absence. The Principal will determine if the explanation provided is a **reasonable excuse** for the purposes of the parent meeting their responsibilities under the <u>Education Training Reform Act 2006</u> (Vic) and the <u>School Attendance Guidelines</u>.

If Simpson Primary School considers that the parent has provided a reasonable excuse for their child's absence the absence will be marked as 'excused absence'.

If the school determines that no reasonable excuse has been provided, the absence will be marked as 'unexcused absence'.

The Principal has the discretion to accept a reason given by a parent for a student's absence. The Principal will generally excuse:

- medical and dental appointments, where out of hours appointments are not possible or appropriate
- bereavement or attendance at the funeral of a relative or friend of the student, including a student required to attend Sorry Business
- school refusal, if a plan is in place with the parent to address causes and support the student's return to school
- cultural observance if the parent/carer notifies the school in advance
- family holidays where the parent notifies the school in advance

If no explanation is provided by the parent within 10 school days of an absence, it will be recorded as an 'unexplained absence' and recorded on the student's file.

Parents will be notified if an absence has not been excused.

Managing non-attendance and supporting student engagement

Where absences are of concern due to their nature or frequency, or where a student has been absent for more than five days, Simpson Primary School will work collaboratively with parents, the student, and other professionals, where appropriate, to develop strategies to improve attendance, including:

- establishing an Attendance Student Support Group
- implementing a Return to School Plan
- implementing an Individual Education Plan
- implementing a Student Absence Learning Plan for students who will be absent for an extended period
- arranging for assistance from relevant services e.g. SSS, Orange Door

We understand from time to time that some students will need additional supports and assistance, and in collaboration with the student and their family, will endeavour to provide this support when it is required.

Referral to School Attendance Officer

If Simpson Primary School decides that it has exhausted strategies for addressing a student's unsatisfactory attendance, we may, in accordance with the School Attendance Guidelines refer the non-attendance to a School Attendance Officer in the South-Western Victoria Region for further action.

If, from multiple attempts to contact with a parent, it becomes apparent that a student will not be returning to the school, the Principal may make a referral to a School Attendance Officer if:

- the student has been absent from school on at least five full days in the previous 12 months where:
 - o the parent has not provided a reasonable excuse for these absences; and
 - o measures to improve the student's attendance have been undertaken and have been unsuccessful
- the student's whereabouts are unknown and:
 - o the student has been absent for 10 consecutive school days; or
 - o no alternative education destination can be found for the student.

- Included in enrolment packs
- Reminders in our school newsletter
- Hard copy available from school administration upon request
